

### WHAT'S 2023 GOT IN STORE FOR US?

Considering the horrors of the long red hot summer last year, the final harvesting figures for autumn 2022 were surprisingly good in most cases and the quality wasn't too shabby either. However, some spring crops weren't so lucky! The rain came very timely in autumn 2022 to produce almost perfect establishment conditions. The result was that most of you got drilled up and the resulting crops on the whole look very good. Fingers crossed for a more average summer this year!

(WCR) ON PULSES!

Initially, we thought that any benefits of applying our micro-nutrient/bio-stimulant WCR to pulses would be marginal if not detrimental, considering they're legumes which fix their own nitrogen through symbiotic nitrogen-fixing bacteria within the root nodules and all that... Because of this, we've never really pushed putting WCR on pulses. However, the reality must be somewhat different.

# HIGH BOUGHT IN SEED PRICES MEAN MORE "FARM SAVED SEED (FSS)"

Bought in seed prices are extremely high at the moment due to current affairs creating high commodity prices and inflated input costs. It's no surprise that this has resulted in farmers making the wise move towards doing more FSS (some for the first time). They can then look forward to substantial cost savings, having greater control over seed quality and general flexibility of FSS. Also, don't forget, there's nothing stopping you farm saving from that same initial bought in seeds progeny for as long as you want to. Bought in seed that's sold as a "new variety" is at least 10 generations (years) old when you buy it for the first time as "new seed". If you buy "new seed" of an older variety, then it could be as old as the hills...

#### MICRO-NUTRIENTS - DOUBLE THE BENEFITS

Farmers using our micro-nutrients/bio-stimulants "Winter Crop Reformulated" (WCR) and/or "Manganese" will have double the benefits this year. As well as probably being the best products on the market, if you consider the cost of fertiliser at the moment they'll also be about the cheapest way of getting those essential elements onto your seed and into the crops. Because of this, we've never really pushed putting WCR on pulses. However, the reality must be somewhat different. Yes, pulses are legumes and yes they fix nitrogen via the root nodules but not until the nodules are well formed. So when you put WCR on your pulses you'll get the same benefits as you do when you put it on your other seed species. Plus it'll help get the seedling up and away as soon as possible and aid establishment, all of which will also help to get those nodules working more quickly. The quicker the nodules get to work, the more nitrogen they can fix!! The above must have some merit as more and more farmers are asking us to put WCR on their beans, most of them not for the first time either.

This is the seed processed by CYO and converted into hectares to show relative land use




Nitrogen fertiliser prices are still high, so it's no surprise that we've processed proportionally more beans last Autumn which is shown in the data above. The interesting one is, even though we processed a lot more FSS in general last Autumn, the wheat area as a proportion has actually reduced for the third year running. Oil seed rape however, is also on the increase again as farmers seem to be getting back into the crop.

Looking at the graphs below you'll see that KWS Extase wheat has more than retained its top spot with a margin of 10% over Gleam. Interestingly, 7 out of the top 10 wheat's processed by us are in the same position as they were last year. Campus rape has lost its crown to Acacia and Aspire respectively. Winter Barley still has KWS's Orwell as the most popular variety but KWS Tardis and Bolton have come from nowhere into second and third places, next year, who knows!! The Beans area is dominated by Tundra again but Vespa has gained a lot of popularity this year and could be a challenger next Autumn. Oats are just oats, nothing much challenges the dominance of Mascani.

No prizes for figuring out that the main farmer focus is very much on yield potential, disease profile and overall quality.
